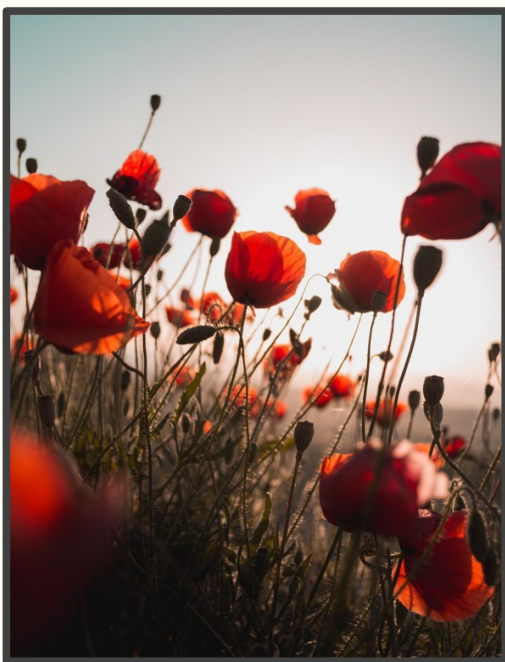

The presiding minister welcomes the congregation and reads one or more of the following sentences.

Act of Penitence
